Aim of Religious Education

The aim of the Religious Education curriculum is to help children mature in relation to their spiritual, moral and religious lives, through their encounter with, exploration and celebration of the Catholic faith.¹

The curriculum distinguishes four interrelated strands of Christian Faith, The Word of God, Liturgy/Prayer and Christian Morality. The strands overlap and interact to from a holistic learning experience for the child.

<u>Christian Faith</u>: Teaching and learning in this strand assists children to become religiously literate in key truths, doctrines and practices of the Catholic religious tradition.

<u>The Word of God</u>: This strand introduces children to an age-appropriate way to Sacred Scripture in the life of the Church.

<u>Liturgy and Prayer</u>: Children are encouraged to engage with liturgical signs, symbols and rituals, which nurture their relationship with God as Father, Son and Spirit, and to develop their capacity for personal prayer and for participation in the liturgy of the Church.

<u>Christian Morality</u>: The teaching and learning in this strand helps children to grow in awareness of their identity as persons created in the image and likeness of God and called to live in loving, respectful, relationship with God, other human persons and the whole of creation. This strand introduces children to Jesus as the example for living an ethical life and are formed in gospel values and in love of God and neighbour. ²

SUGGESTED GUIDELINES TOWARDS THE FORMULATION OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION POLICY FOR CATHOLIC PRIMARY SCHOOLS

1.INTRODUCTORY STATEMENT

The school is a Catholic school under the patronage of the Catholic Archbishop of Dublin.

- State how the policy was formulated and who was involved, e.g. Board of Management, Teachers, Chaplain, Parents/ Guardians, Special Needs Assistants, Ancillary Staff, Student Council etc...
- The Mission Statement of the school
- A brief history of the school
- Rationale
- State the symbols that are on display to identify that the school is a Catholic school, e.g. a crucifix/statue or image of Our Lady/ St Joseph, a holy water font, and a picture or statue of the patron saint of the school

2. THE CATHOLIC CHURCH AND PRIMARY RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

- How are staff led and supported in the teaching of Religious Education
- State where *The Schedule of a Catholic School* is on display in a public place within the school
- On the class timetable record where the teacher teaches Religious Education for 30 minutes daily.

5. MATERIALS

- The *Catholic Preschool and Primary Religious Education Curriculum for Ireland* (2015) is the foundation document for all Religious Education in Catholic primary schools
- The Irish Episcopal Conference approved the *Grow in Love/InGrá Dé* Religious Education programme (the only programme for use in Catholic primary schools in Ireland)
- Record that each teacher has his or her own *Grow in Love* Teacher Manual, CD and poster set. Ensure that each teacher has registered with the login code for the *Grow in Love* programme and is using the school email address
- State that each child has access to the *Grow in Love* Children's' Book appropriate to the child's class level
- State the day that the children at all class levels will bring home materials from the *Grow in Love* Religious Education programme
- State whether children from third class upwards use journals/copies designated for Religious Education
- State the approved Bibles the school has available (e.g. *Contemporary English Version*, the *Good News Bible*, *New Revised Standard Version* or *The Catholic Children's Bible*)
- State how *monthly memos* sent out by the Education Secretariat are circulated.

6. PRAYER SPACE

Each class should have a designated prayer space, which changes in accordance with the liturgical cycle and as instructed in the *Grow in Love* Religious Education programme.

7. PRAYER

Participation in experiences of prayer (formal and informal), silence and meditation develops children's capacity for personal prayer.
