
Throughout the month of November and on the feast of All Souls (2 November), we remember family and friends who have returned home to heaven. We also remember those who have no one to pray for them.

Let us pray:


Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. Amen.

5 November: Saint Martin de Porres



What was Martin de Porres life like?

St. Martin de Porres had great compassion for all people, regardless of their race or status, and his loving care extended to animals, including stray cats and dogs, beasts of the field, and even kitchen vermin. In addition to his untiring work looking after the sick, Martín distributed food and alms to the poor and needy in Lima.



14 November: Saint Laurence O'Toole



Saint Laurence O'Toole - Patron Saint of Dublin

St Laurence O'Toole was born in Castledermot, Co. Kildare in 1128. He became Abbot of Glendalough in 1153 and Archbishop of Dublin in 1162. He died in Eu in Normandy on the 14th of November 1180 and was canonised in 1225.

Laurence was a man of prayer.

He rose early in the morning to pray the office (Morning Prayer) with the other monks and often stayed on afterwards, deep in prayer.

21 November: The Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary

Mary was offered to God in the Temple when she was three years old.

The feast highlights the holiness of Mary from the beginning of her life on earth that continued through her early childhood and beyond.



Before Mary's birth, her parents, Joachim and Anne, received a heavenly message that they would have a child.

In thanksgiving for God's gift of Mary's birth, they brought her to the Temple to present their only daughter to the Lord.

The feast commemorates the faith of Mary's parents, Joachim and Anne, and the saintliness of Mary herself.

Mary, pray for us.

St. Joachim and St. Anne, pray for us.


24 November: Christ the King
